Who We Serve

The Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), an agency of the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), supports equitable health care for the nation's highest-need communities.



HRSA serves those most in need, including:

- **More than 30.5 million people** in rural in underserved communities
- **More than 58 million pregnant women, infants, and children**
- **More than 560,000 people with HIV**
- **More than 1,900 rural counties and municipalities** across the country
- **Nearly 22,000 health care providers** through loan repayment and scholarship programs

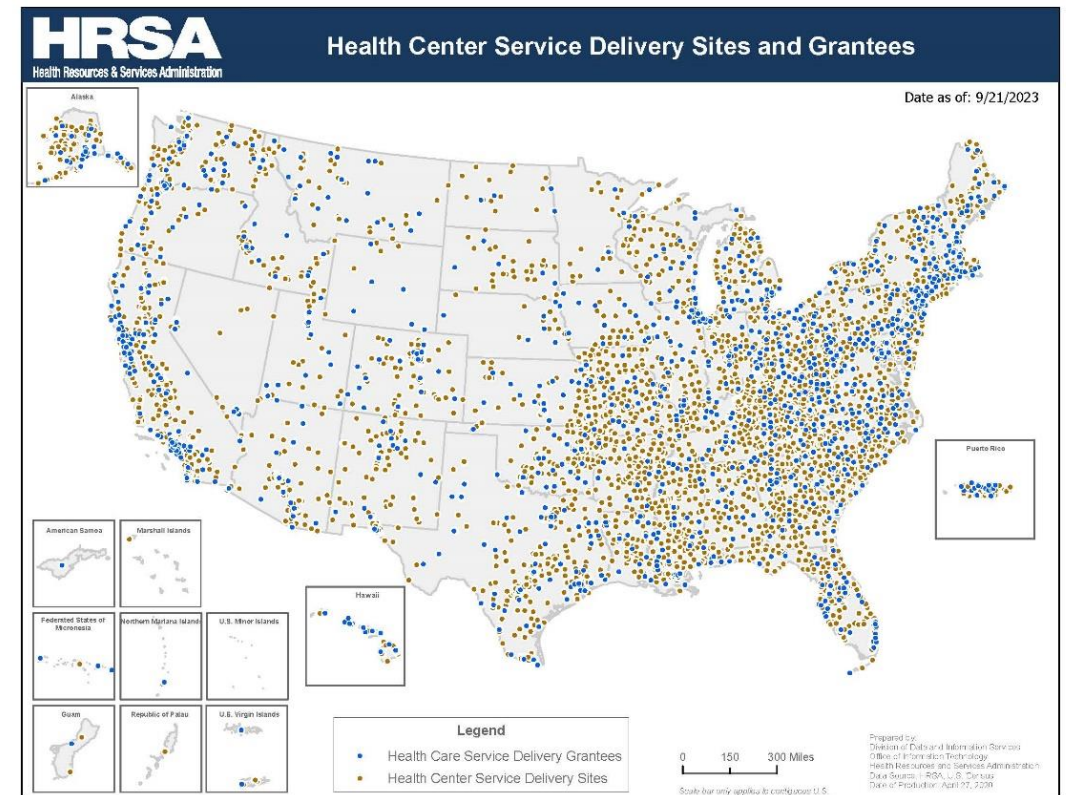

Health Center Program

- In 2023, nearly **1,400** health centers and more than **100** Health Center Program look-alike (LAL) organizations operate nearly **15,000** service delivery sites
- More than **30.5 million** patients.
- Health centers provide **patient-centered, comprehensive, integrated care** by offering a range of services:
 - Primary medical, oral, and mental health services
 - Substance use disorder and Medications for Opioid Use Disorder (MOUD)
 - Enabling services such as outreach, case management, health education, interpretation services, and transportation

Health Center Program Fundamentals



Serve High Need Areas

- Must serve a high need community or population (e.g., HPSA, MUA/P)



Patient Directed

- Private non-profit or public agency that is governed by a patient-majority community board



Comprehensive

- Provide comprehensive primary care and enabling services (e.g., education, outreach, and transportation services)



No One is Turned Away

- Services are available to all, with fees adjusted based upon ability to pay



Collaborative

- Collaborate with other community providers to maximize resources and efficiencies in service delivery

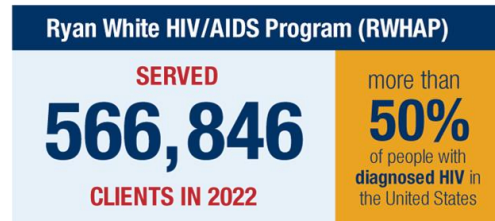

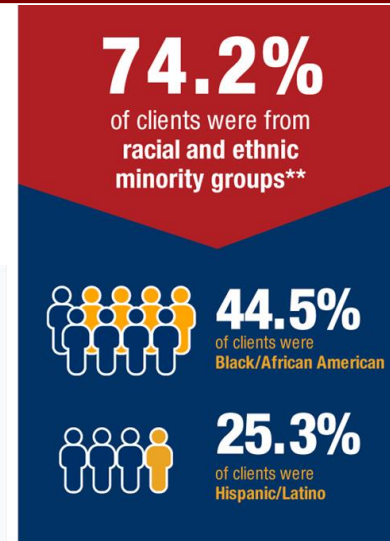

HIV/AIDS Bureau

Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program



in 2022 compared to 69.5% in 2010, which means they cannot sexually transmit HIV to their partner and can live longer and healthier lives.



- The HIV/AIDS Bureau administers the **Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program (RWHAP)**, which provides a comprehensive system of HIV primary medical care, medications, and essential support services for low-income people with HIV
- Funds grants to states, cities, counties, and local community-based organizations to improve health outcomes and reduce HIV transmission
 - Recipients determine service delivery and funding priorities based on local needs and planning process
- More than **566,000 people with diagnosed HIV** receive services through the program in 2022
- In 2022, **89.6%** of RWHAP clients receiving HIV medical care were virally suppressed, exceeding the national average of **69.5%** since 2010

* Viral suppression is based on data for people with HIV who had at least one outpatient ambulatory health services visit and at least one viral load test during the measurement year and whose most recent viral load test result was less than 200 copies/mL.

** Clients self-identified as 25.8% White and less than 2% each American Indian/Alaska Native, Asian, Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander, and persons of multiple races. Hispanics/Latinos can be of any race.



Maternal and Child Health Bureau

The Maternal and Child Health Bureau's mission is to improve the health and well-being of America's mothers, children, and families.

- **Title V Maternal and Child Health Block Grant**
 - Partnership between the federal government and states
 - Served an estimate of **58 million pregnant women, infants, and children** in 2022
 - 93% of all pregnant women
 - 99% of infants
 - 61% of children nationwide, including children with special health care needs
- **Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting Program**
 - Voluntary, evidence-based home visiting services for pregnant people and parents with young children who live in communities that are at risk for poor maternal and child health outcomes
 - Served approximately **138,000 parents and children** in over **69,000 families** and provided over **840,000 home visits** in 2022
- **Healthy Start**
 - Provides grants to communities with infant mortality rates **at least 1.5x** the U.S. national average
 - Provides services and facilitates access to comprehensive health and social services
 - Healthy Start served just over **85,000 participants** in 2022.

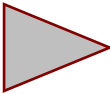

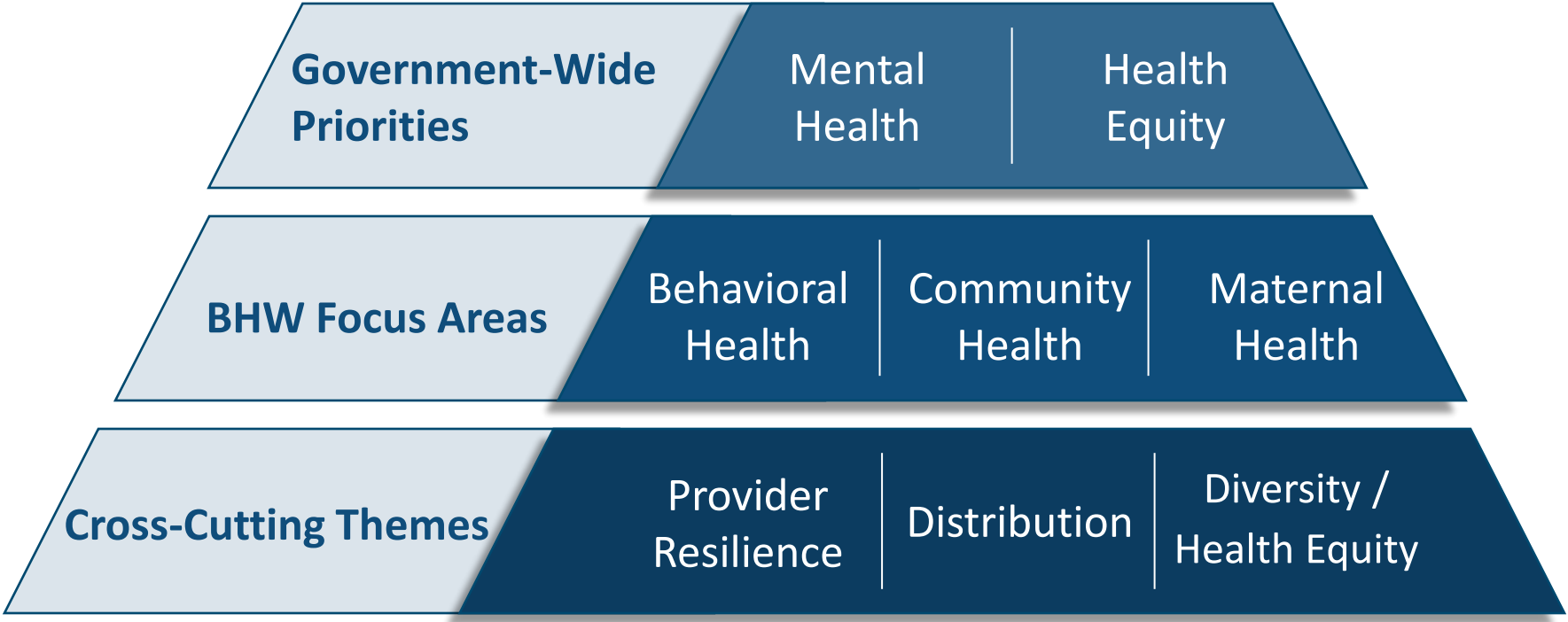

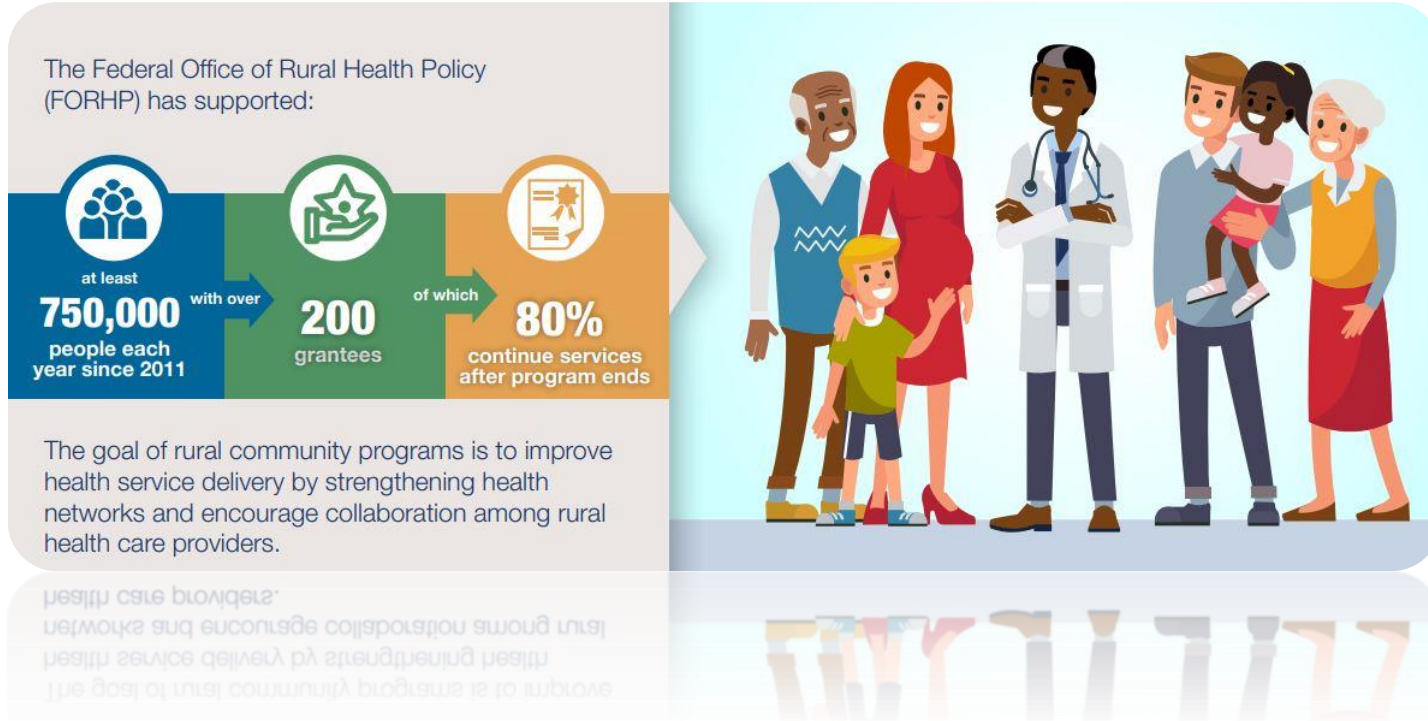

- **1 in 5 rural residents** relied on HRSA-funded health centers for care in FY 2023

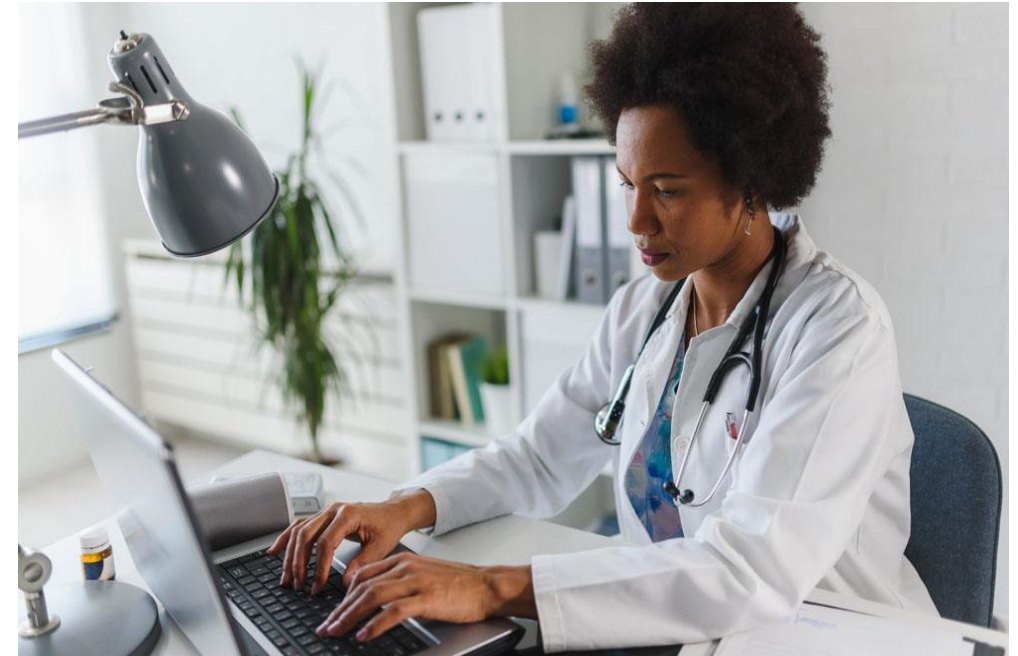


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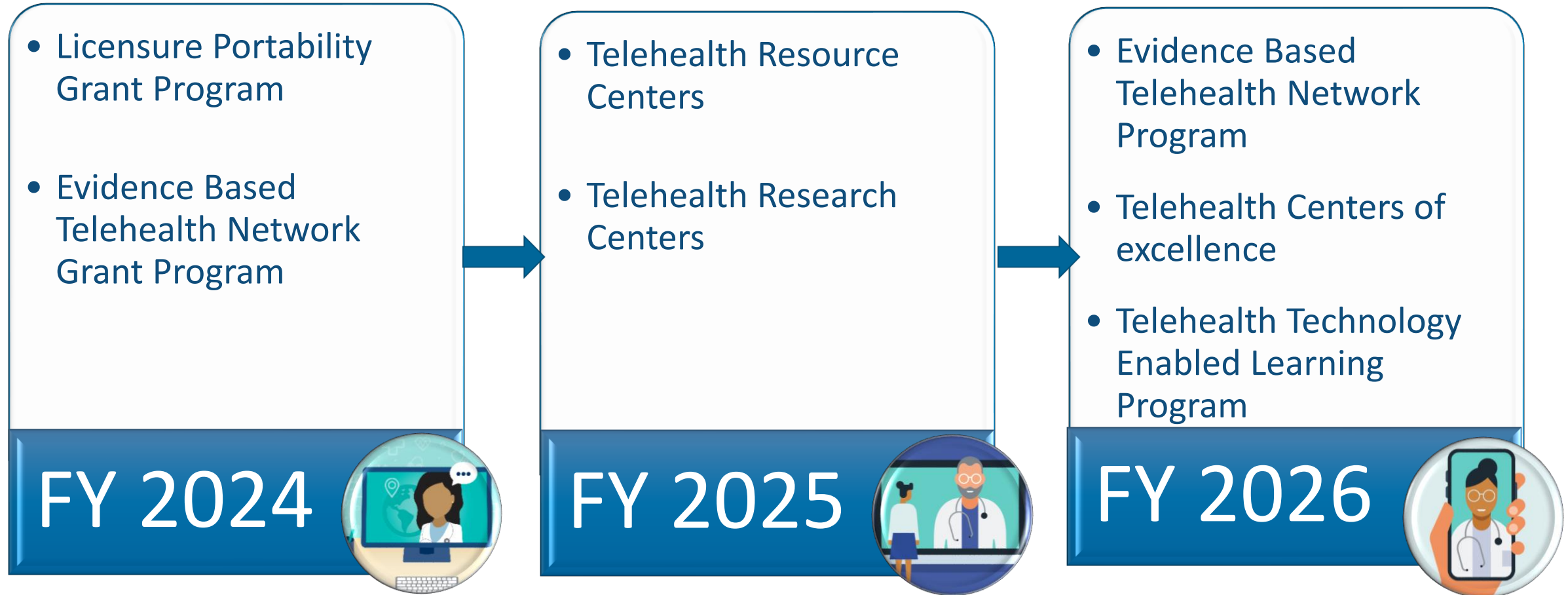

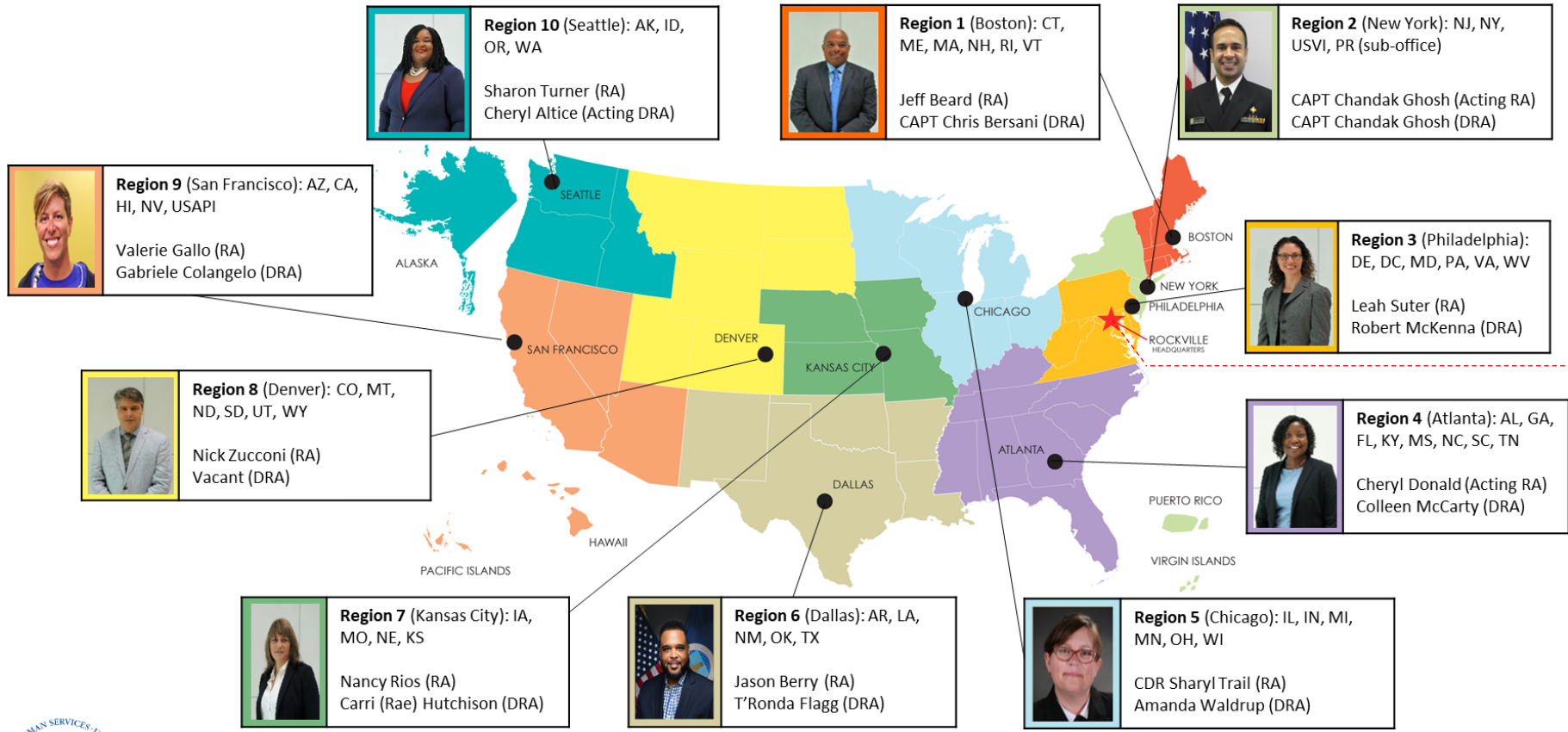

Tribal Affairs and External Affairs



Office of External Affairs

- Partner and liaise with HRSA Bureaus and Offices and Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), Office of Intergovernmental and External Affairs (IEA) to forge and strengthen relationships with key public health organizations
- Coordinate activities with external entities across the nation
- Respond to inquiries from federal, state, and local governments

HRSA Tribal Affairs

- Serve as HRSA's primary point of contact for tribal governments and tribal organizations and HRSA liaison to and representative on tribal health-related committees and working groups.
- Coordinate with HRSA Bureaus and Offices to leverage resources or develop initiatives to support tribal health resources and services.
- Manage, support, and convene the HRSA Tribal Advisory Council.



HRSA Tribal Advisory Council (TAC)

Overview

Purpose

To provide a forum wherein elected tribal officials acting in their official capacity (or their designated employees with authority to act on their behalf) and HRSA staff convene to exchange views, information, or advice about emerging public health issues in Indian Country, identify urgent public health resources and service needs, and apply collaborative approaches to address the issues and needs of American Indian and Alaska Native populations.

How to Prepare Your Application

Completing a grant application can take 40 hours or more. We want to help you navigate the process.

Where should I begin?

Before you begin, ask yourself the following questions:

- Have I read the Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO)? Do I understand it?
- Is my organization eligible to apply, based on the eligibility criteria in the NOFO?
- Does my organization have the technical expertise, personnel, and financial capacity to successfully implement the project described in the NOFO?
- Are all my organization's stakeholders supportive of applying for this grant?
- Is my organization prepared to successfully implement the project within the budget we're proposing?

If you can answer "yes" to each of these questions, you're ready to apply.

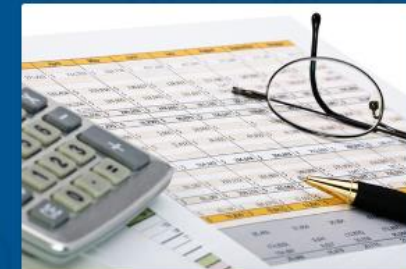
